






History/Background

- Established in 1904 as the Griffin Drain.
- Cleaned out in 1936 as the Griffin Drain.
- Consolidated into the St. Charles Relief Drain in 1976-1977, adding storm sewer and cleaning out the open drain (previously named the Griffin Drain).
 - The consolidation was completed under Chapter 20 of the Michigan Drain Code of 1956.
 - Ch. 20 indicates that all costs to establish/construct a Drain are to be assessed entirely to public corporations.
 - 1977 entire cost for work on the Drain was assessed to the following: County of Saginaw and the Village of St. Charles.


St. Charles Relief Drain




History/Background

- April 13, 2022 Village of St. Charles passed a resolution requesting the Benton Street Relief Drain, a portion of the St. Charles Relief Drain, be abandoned with the Village taking over jurisdiction.
- May 3, 2023 The St. Charles Relief Drain Drainage Board approved the relinquishment of the Benton Street Relief Drain.
- November 8, 2023 Village of St. Charles petitioned to locate, establish & construct the Benton Street Drain.
- There is now potential for a newly established county drain, named Benton Street Drain.
- Since 2020, SCPWC has received multiple calls from landowners noting trees down in the drain & flooding.

Preliminary Drainage District








Potential Drain Layout


- Potential location of the Benton Street Drain
 - See Map (blue lines on map following historical)
 - Approximately 1,075 feet storm sewer & 1,920 feet open drain, total length = 2,295 feet long (0.57 miles)
 - Watershed area: Approx. 40.5 acres
- What is the drainage district?
 - Lands that contribute storm water to drain
 - Drainage District serves as the special assessment district
 - Benton Street Drain Drainage District includes:
 - Village of St. Charles
 - Michigan Department of Transportation (MDOT)
 - Landowners Approximately 56 parcels




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

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Appeal Procedures – Section 280.72a

Whenever the board of determination finds by majority vote of the whole number of members that the drain is or is not necessary, any person feeling aggrieved by the determination may institute an action in the circuit court for the county in which the real property is located for a determination of necessity. The action shall be filed by the person aggrieved within 10 days after the determination of necessity or no necessity by the board of determination.
