**RE: MILLAGE RENEWAL AND INCREASE REQUEST** 

Dear Chairman Boyd:

**REQUEST SECTION:** The Commission on Aging (COA) is requesting approval to place a renewal and increase of its current millage from 0.59 mills up to 0.69 mills on the August 2024 ballot for the years 2025-2030, both inclusive, which if fully levied is estimated to raise \$4,547,105 in the first year of the levy.

The draft ballot language is as follows:

SAGINAW COUNTY COMMISSION ON AGING

EXTRA VOTED MILLAGE RENEWAL AND INCREASE PROPOSAL

"For the purpose of continuing the operation of the Saginaw County Commission on Aging within the County, shall the County of Saginaw, Michigan ("County") RENEW the previously approved extra millage, which last resulted in a levy of .59 mill (\$0.59 per \$1000.00) of taxable valuation of such property as finally equalized, and INCREASE the millage limitation on the total amount of general ad valorem taxes, which may be imposed for all purposes upon real and personal property in the County, as provided in Article 9 Section 6 of the Michigan Constitution of 1963, as amended, which will result in a total levy of up to .69 mill (\$0.69 per \$1000.00) of taxable valuation of such property in the years 2025 to 2030, both inclusive, which renewal and increase is estimated to raise up to \$4,547,105 in the first year?"

BACKGROUND INFORMATION SECTION: The six-year current Senior Millage final levy will be December 31, 2025. Therefore, the Commission on Aging will need to again ask for community support for the Senior Millage, and it is the recommendation of the COA Advisory Board, by unanimous motion, to request a renewal and an increase from 0.59 to 0.69.

The board had an in-depth discussion regarding the importance of programs and services offered by the Commission on Aging to constituents in their districts. It was determined that these services would significantly have to be reduced if COA did not ask for an increase. The increase is anticipated to generate a projected additional \$659,000 in revenue the first year of the levy. A four-year renewal without an increase, was considered. Without an increase it is projected that year 1 of a renewal would

result in a \$186,613 deficit, year 2 a \$334,509 deficit, year 3 a \$344,670 deficit, and year 4 a \$612,756 deficit. The agency does not have sufficient resources to support this, even short term. A reduction in services would also result in lost federal/state resources for Saginaw County, as grant funding is tied into most positions/programs at the agency.

When the Commission on Aging asked for a renewal and increase in 2018, cost projections were utilized but were very conservative in that request. It was and continues to be important to not to ask for more than we need, but to also recognize when the cost of operations is not possible without adequate support. Subsequently, the agency could also not project the impact of the Wage Compensation Study, which was implemented in 2018 and 2020, on our budget, and the COVID-19 pandemic's impact on food/supplies costs for the Nutrition program, which continues to see a high demand for services. Food/supplies alone absorbed a 10-15% year over year increase from April 2020 to September 2023 (approximately a \$200,000 increase on the budget), which has been supported by pandemic relief funding through CARES, FFCRA, and Older American Act ARPA funds. At the end of FY24, these funds will be depleted. Consequently, fund balance will be required to balance the FY25 budget to maintain current operations (FY25 is the last operating year on the current millage).

Census data from 2020 results show that 27% of the population in Saginaw County is over the age of 60 and only expected to increase. The youngest "baby boomer" generation turns 60 this year. Meaning that the baby boomer age range is now from 60 years old to 78 years old. Individuals born between 1946 and 1964 reflected the largest birth rates in history, now qualify for services provided by Commission on Aging. Census Bureau reports show older adults are living longer, are more likely to live alone and have fewer children whom they can rely on. The Commission on Aging is a first point of contact for older adults and their families to understand what options are available to them in the community. More times than not an older adult is aging in place not needing help, then suddenly go into crisis. Whether a medical event, loss of a spouse or companion, or family dynamics change, there are a multitude of variables that can affect one's independence. As individuals age, they will need more in-home supports to safely age in their home. A person's physical ability to access community supports and activities directly affects their quality of life. Nutrition, socialization, access to medical care, and transportation are critical components to aging well. When physical conditions affect a person to the point that they can no longer drive and lose the ability to venture outside of their home environment, supports such as transportation and home delivered meals becomes a lifeline for that person. The senior centers also provide important access points for older adults to understand services available to them, obtain nutritious food options, benefit from socialization, and often find purpose through new friendships and volunteerism.

Much consideration was given regarding the economic climate and impact an increase could have on constituents in Saginaw County. However, reducing programs and services as the population is getting older and needing more supports is an option that does not make sense. As a community, we need to think about older adults and how we can continue to support them. The importance of programs and services was especially evident during the COVID-19 pandemic, when many agencies/organizations were closed, the Commission on Aging adapted and ensured services never discontinued. New programs were added to complement current programming (such as virtual Caregiver Support and Carry-out Meal Program). Services and programs continue to be evaluated to ensure priority is placed on our most vulnerable older adults and responsible use of taxpayer dollars. Additionally, external grants, resources, and new partnerships are always considered to expand and/or support programming. As our population ages, accessibility to programs and services should be placed at a high priority as a County, as this affects overall quality of life.

PARTNERSHIP/COLLABORATION SECTION: Partnerships are vital to the operation of the Commission on Aging. Local property taxes account for approximately 60% of the agencies operating budget. These funds are utilized to provide the match to leverage other federal, state, and local grant funding and/or donations of goods to provide services to those in need. Ongoing partnerships include Region VII Area Agency on Aging, United Way of Saginaw County, AmeriCorps Senior, Michigan Department of Transportation, SVRC Industries, Saginaw ISD Transitions Program, Saginaw Transit Authority and Regional Services, and more.

**STRATEGIC PLANNING SECTION:** This request is aligned with State-of-the-Art County Services, Continued Responsible Management of Fiscal Resources, Increased Collaboration Between Public and Private Sectors. This is also aligned with the Commission on Aging's Senior Services Strategic Plan, adopted in March 2022, which identified the need to advocate for a millage renewal and increase.

**RECOMMENDATION SECTION:** I am recommending the Board of Commissioners approve the above language, as reviewed, modified and approved by Civil Counsel, and direct the County Clerk to place the question before the electorate at the August 6, 2024, Primary Election.
