The First Two Weeks with Your New Dog

- 1. Teach your new dog the rules of your house from the beginning. It is important to remember that dogs do not speak our language and will best understand your expectations through training and management. Training and management should begin the very moment your new dog arrives in your home. Right from the very first day, it is crucial to convey your expectations to the dog and to establish an errorless training system. If you do this, your dog can succeed in learning house rules right from the beginning. If you change the house rules a few days after your dog has arrived, he or she will not understand why things have changed. Your dog may have already formed new habits and will have a difficult time adjusting to yet another set of expectations. It is much more efficient to teach your dog everything you would like home or her to know from the outset.
- 2. Try not to overwhelm your new dog with too much activity during this initial adjustment period. It is best for your dog to spend the first couple weeks quietly settling in and getting to know you. Limit introductions to just a few visitors, and preferably only one or two at a time. If your dog has time to become familiar with you and your home surroundings, they will be more confident when setting out on adventures beyond your immediate neighborhood.
- **3. Keep your new dog confined or supervised at all times.** This is best way to keep your new friend new friend (and house!) out of trouble when you are unable to monitor his actions. Your dog requires a dog-proof, sage place: a "doggie den" the equivalent of a toddler's playpen where he/she can rest and chew appropriate items in your absence. There are many options for your "doggie den," but a crate or small room in your house is ideal.

Remember: always try to build good habits, because good habits are as hard to break as bad ones.

<u>Follow these guidelines for at least the first two weeks with your new dog. Please remember some dogs will</u> take longer to adjust so be patient.

DO immediately show your dog to his/her appropriate toilet area.

DO provide plenty of appropriate chew toys to keep your dog busy and prevent chewing "casualties" in your home and yard. Redirect any chewing "mistakes" by directing your dog to an acceptable alternative.

DO take your dog to the designated toilet area once an hour, every hour, on leash (except overnight.) Allow supervised free time only after he/she relieves themselves in the appropriate area.

DO confine your dog to a "doggie den" whenever you are physically (or mentally!) absent.

DO introduce your dog to new people and other pets **gradually** so as not to overwhelm them. Use kibble and treats to help form a positive associate ion to new people.

DO enroll in a basic obedience class after a few weeks of being used to their new owners! This will help out to understand how to better communicate with your dog in a way he/she will understand. (Recommended)

DON'T allow your dog free run of the entire house right away, or else your new friend may learn all sort of bad habits.

DON'T take your dog off-leash in public until you have successfully completed an obedience class (recommended), or until you know all aspects of your new friend.

DON'T take your new friend to public places (like the dog park, or pet friendly store), until the routine of house and bonding has been more defined.

I understand that SCACC has limited information about the animal's history and can't make any warranties about the animal's health, personality, temperament, or compatibility with my household. I accept a animal in its "as is" condition. I understand that SCACC makes no guarantee as to the health, history, behavior, breed or age of this animal. I accept all risks relating to same.
I understand that all cats and dogs are spayed or neutered before adoption.
I acknowledge that shelter animals have an increased risk of potential exposure to disease, and therefore may be incubating diseases that are undetected by shelter staff. I accept all risks relating to same.
I acknowledge that although SCACC has a veterinarian, there may be occasions where a diagnosis or condition of this animal may be dormant or not obvious prior to adoption.
In the event that this animal becomes sick before I take possession, this adoption will be cancelled, refunded, or another adoptable animal may be chosen.
I understand that unless otherwise stated, the animal has not been treated for or vaccinated against any diseases. I will take this pet to a veterinary office for an exam and any necessary care and vaccines within 7-10 days following adoption and at my sole expense. I will also have my pet examined and vaccinated annually, or as recommended by a veterinarian, at my sole expense.
If I move, change address, phone numbers or email, I understand I should update the microchip and license information.
I acknowledge my animal (if a dog) is required by law to have a current rabies vaccine and county license for the duration of its life in Saginaw County.
I understand that there is a "leash law" in Saginaw County and my dog may not roam or run loose. My home will either provide adequate fencing or I will take necessary precautions, such as leashing, when my pe is outside to prevent it from running loose or onto other property.
